Regular Tribal Council Meeting, March 7th, 2024

- Tribal Council approved one (1) land assignment application.
- Tribal Council approved a non-binding MOU between the Bishop Paiute Tribe and the Alliance for Tribal Clean Energy.
- Tribal Council approved a donation in the amount of \$2,800 to fund Bishop Union High School tribal band students to travel to Washington, D.C.

• Constitution Informational Meeting – Tuesday, March 26th, 2024 – 1:00 PM (Elders Building).

Public Comment

- V. Goodwin asked when we are going to have TIHP update? Tribal Council stated they will follow-up with the TIHP representative to present at the next regular meeting.
- S. Gostisha, Geeks Without Frontier Director, thanked everyone for completing the broadband survey.
- C. Lange announced a public hearing will be held on April 18, 2024 in Barstow, CA for a hearing regarding the proposed Mono Basin BPA and draft SED, and she encouraged people to attend.
- C. Williams Attended the Elders Coalition and there were concerns regarding Crossroads opening a sober living facility on the reservation. This needs to be addressed and discussed at the General Council Meeting. Tribal Council stated that it will be added to the next General Council Meeting agenda.

The Bishop Paiute Tribe Social Services RAVE program has expanded its victim services to the local school district. After months of planning and meeting with the school officials, we now have a space and a day allocated to RAVE to provide Peer Counseling and Support Services. Tuesday, March 12th was the first day on campus and our Peer Crisis Counselor was able to help those in crisis. We originally planned to have RAVE on campus for two to three hours on Tuesdays however, it became evident that there is a strong need for peer counseling therefore, RAVE will be at the school every Tuesday from 8:30am to 4:00pm.

April 5th, 2024, is Wear Blue Day! Dress in blue to stand in solidarity with child abuse prevention efforts.



Alcohol use among American Indians and Alaska Natives aged 12 or older:

- 79.6% reported they drank alcohol at some point in their lifetime
- 56.5% reported they drank alcohol in the past year.
- 37.6% reported they drank alcohol in the past year.

April is Alcohol Awareness Month. This month allows communities to focus on spreading awareness and reducing the stigma—associated with alcohol addiction. Over time, excessive alcohol consumption can lead to the development of chronic diseases and other serious issues that affect your quality of life, physical and mental health.

Did you know that more than 140,000 deaths occur every year in the United States due to excessive alcohol use? Here are some steps you can take to ensure that alcohol doesn't become a problem for you or your loved ones:

- Show compassion. Share your concerns with your loved ones. Have an honest, clear, and direct conversation about their habits and drinking patterns.
- Understand alcoholism. Educate yourself about the impact of alcohol consumption and discuss it with friends and family Parents, talk
 to your children about the dangers of alcohol and drug use.
- Limit alcohol consumption or try sobriety all together. If you're considering changing your drinking habits, you'll need to decide whether
 to cut it down or quit.
- Stay occupied in a productive way. Get active by exercising or find enjoyment by learning a new skill or hobby that doesn't involve alcohol
- Minimize temptation. Limit the amount of time spent at a bar or other venues that serve alcohol. Engage in social outings and events
 that do not encourage or center around alcohol.
- Seek additional support. Connect with trained medical professionals for additional help, resources, formalized treatment options, and counseling.

I feel very grateful and very thankful for having been able to have received so much amazing care and assistance from the program as well as the overwhelming compassion from the staff, who I have now come to trust and connect with on a welcoming, respectful, caring level of not only responsive, smart, intuitive Advocates, but as reliable understanding non-judgmental members of my inner support group. Specifically I would like to say thank you to Nancy and Cindy who have gone above and beyond to help me and be so supportive when allowing me to confide in them during such a vulnerable emotional time for me. It's not easy to give anyone the trust and honesty when it comes to seeking help in the abusive situation and circumstances that I am facing. Grants and Progress with Strategic Planning Meetings - Dr. Bonnie Eberhardt Bobb

The Tribe recently received a \$20,000 SCE grant for the supplies for the Bishop Paiute Head Start Program and supplies and Science, Technology, Engineering, and Math (STEM) scholarships for the Bishop Paiute Indian Education Program. The Food Sovereignty Program received a \$100,000 grant from CalRecycle for a community-scale composting project, processing food waste and other organic material. Great work!!

Strategic Planning meetings have been held so far. Our process has quite a few steps.

- 1) identify the issues;
- 2) establish a vision for the reservation;
- 3) Develop categories of effort and prioritize;
- 4) Establish short-term and long-term Goals and Objectives;
 - 5) Plan actions to reach the goals;
- 6) Determine sources of assistance from departments and sources of funding;
 - 7) Review document.

Issues so far have been: need for housing, community clean-up (solid waste and vegetation), water and water hookups, irrigation, drugs and overdose, staff turnover, job creation and training, land acquisition, hotel and other investments, emergency response, firefighter training, traditions of helping each other and working together, fathers helping the young men, dog control, communication of the needs of the people.




Part A - The IMLS Cultural Outreach survey will analyze the strengths and weaknesses of the Cultural Center's outreach and education programs. This will ensure the effectiveness of our activities and resource materials.

Part B - The ANA Language survey will provide insights on better ways to preserve and revitalize the native language of the local Owens Valley Paiute and Western Shoshone people. This will aid in resource expansion on and for our reservation.
